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The Future of Livingston

Most alumni are aware that President McCormick recommended and the Board of Governors has approved a dramatic change in the structure of undergraduate education on the New Brunswick Campus. Among of the most notable changes is the establishment of the School of Arts and Sciences and the elimination of the undergraduate colleges. The full scope of this plan can be reviewed at http://ur.rutgers.edu/transform_ru/. The President's has also committed to an acceleration of plans to expand the student center on the Livingston campus. McCormick has announced a 2007 groundbreaking for the project. In addition, the College with support from the University is currently expanding the Livingston Recreation Center.

President McCormick's plan allows for the creation of residential colleges designed to promote the intellectual, social, and personal growth of students by strengthening the relationship between the classroom instruction and the co/extra-curricular activities of undergraduates. I am pleased to inform you that we are currently planning such a residential college on the Livingston Campus. This residential college will provide for the continuance of some currently important and historical values of Livingston College. The academic focus of the Livingston Residential College will be the College's minor in Organizational Leadership, as well as creation of new area of study in Community and Global Understanding. These areas embody many of the intellectual values that have been a hallmark of Livingston College and will blend well with many of Livingston's co-curricular activities such as our Global Futures Symposia, our student leadership programs, our community service and internship programs and the new School of Arts and Sciences emphasis on international studies.

This concept of a Livingston Residential College has been formally endorsed by the Dean's Advisory Council, the Fellows of Livingston College, and has been enthusiastically received by the Executive Council of the LAA. We are currently working with academic staff and faculty to provide a detailed plan for this residential college. Our goal is to have a plan in place for review by the appropriate faculty bodies by the end of Fall 2006 semester and have the plan before the President and the Board of Governors by the end of Spring 2007 semester. Our objective is to have the Livingston Residential College operational for the Fall of 2007. With the continued support of alumni and friends of both Livingston College and Rutgers University, we can together continue to enhance and enrich the educational experience of undergraduates at our great institution. We will be share with you information regarding the development of Livingston Residential College as they unfold.

AVERY BROOKS, LC '73, actor and tenured professor at the Mason Gross School of the Arts, is best known to American TV audiences for his roles as Commodore/Captain Benjamin Lafayette Sisko on "Star Trek: Deep Space Nine" and Hawk on "Spenser: For Hire." Known for his dedication to African-American issues, Brooks serves as artistic director for the National Black Arts Festival, in association with Rutgers University. He spent 10 years performing the acclaimed role of Phillip Hayes Dean in the play "Paul Robeson," including performances at the Westwood Playhouse and the Kennedy Center. Brooks has hosted several documentaries and served as narrator in such features as the IMAX film "Africa's Elephant Kingdom."



COLLEEN FRASER, LC '74, was one of the heroes of United Airlines Flight 93 who kept their plane from becoming another weapon of destruction on September 11, 2001. Fraser, an advocate for people with disabilities for 20 years, served on the New Jersey Developmental Disabilities Council for more than 11 years. She was appointed chair of the Council by Governor James Florio in 1990 and served in that position for five years.



MARK HELIAS, LC '74, a world-renowned bassist and composer, has been making innovative music since the mid-seventies and epitomizes Livingston's early reputation as a jazz music school hotbed. He has released eight albums since 1984 and has worked with numerous bands. Helias has also composed music for short film and two feature films by director Jay Anania. In addition to his many performances on records and CDs, Helias has produced recordings for other artists. Helias is currently leading and collaborating on various projects, and teaches at Sarah Lawrence College, The New School and The School for Improvised Music.



LIZA KIRSCHENBAUM, LC '87, the founding state director of Court Appointed Special Advocates of New Jersey. Liza currently serves as CASA's director of public affairs. She earned her Juris Doctorate from New York University School of Law after graduating summa cum laude from Livingston. In addition to fulfilling her duties as CASA of New Jersey's Director of Public Affairs, Liza serves on the Advisory Board of Foster and Adoptive Family Services of New Jersey, the New Jersey Task Force on Child Abuse and Neglect and the Task Force Protection Sub-Committee

GREGG SPIRIDELLIS, LC '93, the co-owner of Jiblab Media. Greg and his brother Evan started their company in 1999 from a garage in Brooklyn, NY. In 2004, Gregg's lyrics and Evan's art helped spark an international sensation with the release of Jiblab's election parody "This Land." The two minute short and its follow-up "Good To Be in DC!" were seen over 80 million times online and on every continent. The media frenzy that followed put the brothers in front of millions of people watching *The Tonight Show*, CNN, FOX, CNBC and the *Today Show*. ABC World News Tonight even named the brothers "Persons of the Year."

Happy Birthday LSC

On February 3, 2006, The Livingston Student Center turned 20 years old and we thought a now and then piece on the student center would be of much interest to our alumni.

Since its grand opening in 1986, the LSC intended to become the focal point of Livingston campus. Over the years, the center became a vital part of campus life, but as it continues to facilitate growth to its community, it suffocates from its own stunted growth. Beyond the failures, changes, and improvements, the LSC needs the same thing it needed two decades ago when the doors first opened, more space.

Inside the building, there was Hardee's, a "Thickburger" chain, the Sweet Shoppe, bathrooms, offices, a radio station, and an unfinished College Hall, according to Dean Paul Herman. He said the roof leaked and final construction on the building was completed months later. In a short time, Hardee's went out of business. No events or activities were scheduled and the college radio station, reached no further than students' dorm rooms.

All the life was outside of the building because people were displeased with the student center's condition. "People walked around it," Dean Herman said. "It got the reputation of being a covered walkway."

By the student center's first birthday, a plan for expansion began based on the need for more space and better facilities, Dean Herman said. Little did they know, more than a decade would pass before they saw any major improvements. The LSC did see its share of changes, however. It developed a food court that offered students extra eating options. Furniture in the offices, lounge areas, and patio updated to aesthetically enhance and provide an at-home environment to the student center. More people entered the LSC as it added a game room, organizations, and activities. Students rented videos and hung out in the game room, more organizations formed and held events in College Hall, and Daytime Diversions, small entertainment activities, attracted daily crowds.

Robert Bertrand, station advisor/chief engineer of 90.3 THE CORE radio station remembered the LSC as very small and failing when he came in 1996, but students improved it by gaining access to the people and staff there. Because of better access to the things they need, "now the station provides programming to the greater Piscataway area," he said.



As the LSC survived neglect and built upon its own resources, it also began fostering an environment that safeguarded its commitment to educate the college community. According to the LSC mission statement, the

center's co-curricular program is designed to encourage leadership, social responsibility, and critical thinking. Bertrand believes the LSC succeeded. "The staff genuinely cares. There is a sense of family at the

Livingston Student Center that I haven't seen at other student centers—not that it doesn't exist, but just from what I've seen. We all know each other for better or for worse," Bertrand said. Two of the largest organizations, The Livingston Theatre Company and THE CORE, share Suite 117. Bertrand said members often argue over space and needs. He wishes the station had room for a record library and more equipment and office space. "It's just not big enough," he said.

Dean Herman agrees that the LSC is not big enough to support its activities. "It needs a theatre. The LTC is the only organization that constantly draws in other

campuses." Many people witnessed the change in the cultural climate, but today the LSC is still cramped for space. Finally, in March 2005, President McCormick signed a letter stating that the university would expand the LSC within the next four years. The signature came after many petitions, administrative meetings, presentations, and published articles supported by the Livingston College Governing Association.

The president placed the expansion project as one of the university's top priorities, but there is controversy over whether there will be enough money to improve the LSC after the current budget crisis and the university merger. Dean Herman said the future of the LSC depends on the next move. "If what is included in the addition is helpful to students and the university, then the student center will have a great future. If not, then there will be no difference." He believes the LSC expansion, along with other campus improvements, have the potential to make Livingston the focal point for public service groups to come together and represent the entire university. Although plans for the LSC seem up in the air, Bertrand said, "One way or the other, it will exist. It is student life." He hopes that in another 20 years, the student center will be bigger, have more organizations, more space for the LTC, and a record library for the radio station. "I hope to see a dramatically better building," he said.

Student Center Expansion

Now More Than Ever

With the future of Livingston College uncertain and cutbacks taking place across the board in Rutgers University's overall budget, this is still not the time to pull back on fully funding and building the expansion to the Livingston Student Center in the amount and scope it was originally proposed.

There's talk of groundbreaking taking place this fall with a \$20 million expansion of the student center and dining facilities. However, this dollar figure is much less than the funds that were originally earmarked for this project. The fall groundbreaking also will not include a fixed working area for the Livingston Theatre Company, one of Livingston's crown jewels. It is also important to note that other projects on the New Brunswick/Piscataway campus are reportedly going ahead full speed with no cutbacks in funding.

The students who either choose Livingston as their residential campus or are assigned there deserve comparable facilities to the students who reside at or have classes at the Busch and New Brunswick campuses. This was true before the decision to merge Livingston and other undergraduate colleges, and is even more of an issue today, as the consolidation of the colleges is underway. Cutting back on the resources to bring the Livingston Student Center and dining facilities up to the levels of other facilities is a win-win for students at Livingston and the University as a whole. With a fully-upgraded student center at Livingston, the second-class stigma of this campus will be reduced, resulting in:

- Bringing Livingston's student center up to the level of student centers on other New Brunswick/Piscataway campuses
- A increased desirability to make Livingston a first choice for a student's residence, rather than a last-resort or a choice only because Livingston students may have a car on campus
- A jump start in upgrading other Livingston facilities and spurring development of other projects benefiting students and the surrounding community

Any efforts to expand the facilities in a "halfway" manner will compromise these important initiatives and lessen Livingston's and Rutgers' efforts to reach its goal to provide first-class facilities and programs for all students.


Rutgers Scarlet Knights vs. Ohio University Bobcats
