Please save the date of Tuesday, Nov. 10, for the biennial presentation of the Livingston College Distinguished Alumni Awards and the Livingston Legacy Award. More information on the honorees and how to purchase tickets to the awards ceremony will soon be posted at www.livingstonalumni.org.

These awards are presented by the Livingston Alumni Association, a charter group of the Rutgers University Alumni Association.

The 2015 Distinguished Alumni join 29 others who have been honored since 2000 for contributions they have made in their chosen fields of endeavor, by the leadership they have exhibited, and by the general benefits to the larger society resulting from their activities:

- Robert Bertrand, Chief Engineer for CBS Radio in the New York City market.
- Kenneth Cop, Rutgers University Executive Director of Police Services / Chief of Police.
- Deborah Stokes, Curator for Education and Head of K-12 Programming at the Smithsonian Institution - Museums.

We also are posthumously honoring Wilson Carey McWilliams with the Livingston Legacy Award. McWilliams was a distinguished political science professor at Livingston College and a prolific author who died in 2005.

The Livingston Legacy Award was established in 2008 to recognize faculty and staff who played a key role in the establishment and growth of Livingston College and its mission, and who have contributed to the overall Rutgers and global communities.

Nov. 10 is also Rutgers Charter Day and the university's 249th birthday. At 4 p.m., the university will kick off its yearlong [Rutgers 250 commemoration](#) with fanfare on the lawn of Old Queens, the oldest building at the university. The Charter Day festivities will include refreshments, a fife and drum corps, displays of Rutgers artifacts, actors portraying famous figures from our history, premiere screenings of the anniversary video *Our Revolutionary Spirit*, the sounding of bells by everyone in attendance to ring in the anniversary year, and lots more. This is an opportunity for students, faculty, staff, and alumni to come together from across Rutgers. All are welcome!

Welcome fall with a fun event for the whole family, the annual Scarlet Harvest, to be held from 1-4 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 18.
